Follow this advice to keep safe.

Match the object to the advice that you should follow when using or near this object.

Candle	Always blow it out before you leave the room
Microwave	Never put metal in it
Matches/lighter	Don't touch! Make sure a grown up puts them in a safe place
Fireplace	Don't stand too close in case your clothes catch fire
Hairdryer	Don't use it near a sink or the bath.
	Always make sure you switch it off before you leave the room
Phones/devices	Keep on a hard surface when charging and away from bedding. Never leave this under your pillow
Oven	Don't interrupt your parents or carers when they are cooking as they need to concentrate on what they are doing
Kettle	Don't hold the mug as you pour the water and always make sure there is water in before you switch it on
Toaster	Never stick a fork or knife in if your food is stuck
Lamp	Make sure blankets or clothing don't cover it
Chargers	Remember to unplug this even when it isn't in use. Just because there is no device attached doesn't mean it's safe to leave it
